8 DECENT WORK AND ECONOMIC GROWTH



Almost half of the world's population still lives on the equivalent of about two dollars a day. In many places, simply obtaining a job does not guarantee escaping the clutches of poverty. This slow and uneven progress necessitates rethinking the economic and social policies we adopt to eradicate poverty, with the aid of new tools in this field. The continued lack of decent work opportunities, insufficient investments, and low consumption lead to a weakening of the fundamental social contract on which democratic societies are based: the requirement for everyone to share in progress.

As part of its efforts to enhance legal knowledge and develop the academic environment, Alnoor University, in collaboration with the Nineveh Court of Appeals, organized a specialized scientific workshop titled: “The Legal Status of Faculty Members in Private Higher Education Institutions.” The workshop was attended by a distinguished group of judges and academics, where participants discussed the legal framework governing the work of faculty members in private higher education institutions, in addition to the challenges and proposed mechanisms to address them. The workshop also addressed the role of private universities in supporting the labor market and expanding higher education opportunities, as well as the importance of aligning legislation with academic realities. Attendees emphasized the necessity of strengthening cooperation between private universities and judicial institutions to develop legal regulations, contributing to the enhancement of the educational environment and achieving higher-quality academic outcomes.
